





GENERAL REMARKS

The 2020-2021 cloud seeding program officially began on November 15th, however NAWC was asked to consider seeding operations for a storm a week prior to this date. Two storm events affected the area and were treated during the month.

On November 7-8, an upper level trough over the western U.S. brought the first significant round of rain and higher elevation snow to central California, a welcome sight given the fires and poor air quality of the previous couple months. Much cooler air also arrived with the storm system and remained for a few days after the storm departed. Warming ensued prior to the mid-month point ahead of another storm system that would impact the area on the 18th. Additional rain and snow fell across the area mainly north of Tulare County, with the greatest amounts for the Kings Basin over the northern third. As this was a warm system, snow levels were between 7000 and 8000 feet. Beyond this system and for the remainder of the month, an upper level ridge was situated either over or just west of California, with occasional disturbances brushing by bringing brief increases in clouds and winds, but no precipitation. Temperatures for this latter part of November were generally around average.

Looking at the state in terms of monthly precipitation for November, over 75% of the state saw less than 50% of the normal monthly precipitation, with the mountains of San Diego County, portions of the northern Sierra Nevada mountains and parts of northeastern and far northern California seeing between 50 and 90% of the normal monthly precipitation. Highest precipitation totals were, as would be expected, over the far northwest corner of the state where between 7 and 10 inches of precipitation was recorded. Lowest precipitation totals were, as expected, over the southeast deserts where less than a tenth of an inch was recorded.

Across the remainder of the United States, below normal precipitation was recorded for many areas of the country, with the Northern Plains, Desert Southwest, Intermountain West and portions of the southern U.S. seeing much below normal precipitation (i.e., below 25% of normal precipitation). In contrast, above normal to much above normal precipitation was recorded in the northern Rockies, parts of the interior Pacific Northwest, central/southern Florida, portions of the Central Plains, the upper Midwest, and a good chunk of the mid-Atlantic coastal states up into New England.

NOVEMBER 2020 WEATHER AND STORM SUMMARY

November 7 – 8

A large upper level trough – the first significant storm of the season – pushed into the west coast states on November 7th with a lead shortwave disturbance moving across central and northern California bringing light rain and higher elevation snow to the area. As moisture was limited with this first system, no seeding operations took place.

A second disturbance quickly followed on the 8th, dropping south-southeastward from the Lake Tahoe area. Precipitation arrived in the target area right around sunrise along with much colder temperatures. Early morning upstream 700 mb (approximately 10,000 feet MSL) temperatures at Oakland were around -10°C, and even at 850 mb (~ 5000 feet MSL) they were slightly below freezing. Snow levels were observed around 3000 feet. With the flow mainly westerly early, transitioning to northwesterly as the morning progressed, sites were limited to those that favored this flow regime. Precipitation evolved into convective cells as the morning progressed and daytime heating of the cool unstable airmass took place. Scattered snow showers and even a few thunderstorms continued to move across the target area through the afternoon, eventually ending by late afternoon as the disturbance pushed off to the southeast and daytime heating waned.

During the storm, four ground-based generators were used.

Storm total precipitation included 0.69" at Balch Camp, 0.33" at Cedar Grove and 0.55" at Wishon Dam.

Seedability: Excellent.




Figure 2. Snow Water Equivalent (SWE) from storm event, valid at 0400 PST on November 9, 2020. Image courtesy of CNRFC website, http://www.cnrfc.noaa.gov/ .

November 17-18

The southern extent of an upper level trough swinging through northern California was expected to move into central California during the pre-dawn hours of the 18th, accompanied by some light precipitation. By early evening of the 17th, the frontal band was oriented from Monterey Bay to south of Lake Tahoe. A plume of subtropical moisture accompanied the trough, with the main trajectory aimed at northern California. Some of this moisture did get entrained into the frontal band that eventually made its way into the western target area around 0530 PST on the 18th, aided by enhanced orographic lift resulting from a strong mid and upper level jet. 700 mb temperatures were around -5°C and snow levels were generally in the 7000-8000 foot range. Higher elevation sites were activated and seeding occurred through the morning and into the early afternoon hours, by which time precipitation came to an end and sites were subsequently shut off. During the storm, five ground-based generators were used.

Storm total precipitation included 0.02" at Balch Camp and 0.31" at Wishon Dam.

Seedability: Good to Very Good.




Figure 3. Location of active CNGs on November 18, indicated by stars.




Figure 4. Storm Total Precipitation for November 18.

The Place to Be

To the Board of Directors of Kings River Conservation District Fresno, California

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, and each major fund of Kings River Conservation District (the District) for the year ended June 30, 2020. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated September 9, 2020. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

Significant Audit Matters

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by the District are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. No new accounting policies were adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during the fiscal year. We noted no transactions entered into by the District during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimates affecting the District's financial statements were:

Management's estimate of the Net Other Post-Employment Benefits Liability is based on the determination of the terms of various health care plans offered, together with relevant actuarial assumptions and health care cost trend rates, projected annual rates and discount rates. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the Net Other Post-Employment Benefits Liability in determining that it is reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Management's estimate of Useful Lives of Fixed Assets and Depreciation Expense is based on the economic useful lives of fixed assets based on past history of similar types of assets, future plans as to their use, and other factors that impact their economic value to the Company. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used by management in computing depreciation expense and believe that it is reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Certain financial statement disclosures are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. The most sensitive disclosure affecting the financial statements was:

Management's estimate of the long-term payable to the Department of Water Resources (DWR). This estimate is based on expected reimbursements from DWR for depreciation expense, debt service costs and other debt-related costs. Management's estimate of deferred revenue is based on the difference between reimbursements received from DWR for operating expenses and the actual expenses incurred. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the DWR receivable and deferred revenue in determining that they are reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Management has corrected all such misstatements. In addition, none of the misstatements detected as a result of audit procedures and corrected by management were material, either individually or in the aggregate, to each opinion unit's financial statements taken as a whole.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated December 3, 2020.

Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the District's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the District's auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

Other Matters

We applied certain limited procedures to the Budgetary Comparison Schedule, Schedule of Changes in the Net OPEB Liability and Related Ratios, and Schedule of OPEB Contributions which are required supplementary information (RSI) that supplements the basic financial statements. Our procedures consisted of inquiries of management regarding the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We did not audit the RSI and do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the RSI.

Restriction on Use

This information is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Directors and management of Kings River Conservation District and is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties.

SUBJECT: General Manager's Status Report for the Month of November 2020

This memorandum was prepared to supplement the monthly reports of the District's management team and to highlight specific items and activities for the month of November 2020.

State Affairs

Legislative

All five State Assembly seats for the Kings River region were on the November 3rd ballot. All five incumbents were re-elected. They include: District 5-Frank Bigelow, R; District 23-Jim Patterson, R; District 26-Devon Mathis, R; District 31-Joaquin Arambula, D; and District 32-Rudy Salas, Jr.. D. No State Senate seats representing the Kings River region were up for reelection on November 3rd.

All five Congressional seats for the Kings River Region were on the November 3rd ballot. Four of the five incumbents were reelected. They include: District 4-Tom McClintock, R; District 16-Jim Costa, D; District 22-Devin Nunes, R; and District 23-Kevin McCarthy, R. Incumbent TJ Cox, representing District 21, lost to David Valadao, R.

COVID-19

In light of an unprecedented rapid rise in COVID-19 cases across California, Governor Gavin Newsom and the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) announced a limited Stay at Home Order requiring that non-essential work, movement, and gatherings stop between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. in counties in the purple tier. The order took effect at 10 p.m. Saturday, November 21st and will remain in effect until 5 a.m. December 21st. This is the same as the March Stay at Home Order, but applies only between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m., and only in purple tier counties that are seeing the highest rates of positive cases and hospitalizations.

San Joaquin Valley Blueprint (SJVB)

I will be speaking with Scott Hamilton from the San Joaquin Valley Blueprint Technical Study in the coming week or so. He wished to deepen his understanding of KRCD's functions and the interplay of those functions with the Blueprint. He desires both to better his own understanding and understand concerns in our region, as well as to share information KRCD may find useful. This may be one of several future conversations.

Regulatory

State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB)

The State Water Resources Control Board released its draft 2021 Strategic Work Plan on November 17th. The plan lays out the SWRCB thematic priorities, subsidiary goals, and specific actions. The Gualco Group has identified several impactful – and possibly controversial – policies and programs, including:

Public health

- COVID-19. Collect water district and consumer financial impact data for Board review on matters of district financial failure and residential shutoffs.
- Drinking water enforcement. Set water quality enforcement for threatened sources, with emphasis on supplies for Disadvantaged Communities (DACs).
- Chrome six. Adopt Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL).
- Source control for reuse. Develop statewide source control for emerging contaminants of concern; protect recycled water uses.
- Stormwater infiltration. Requirements for capture and drywell infiltration.

Ecosystems

- Environmental flow framework. Continue collaboration with State agencies, academic researchers and "water user partners" for the framework, including site-specific instream flow need review and setting.
- Flow temperature management.
- Stormwater cost of compliance for statewide Industrial General Permit.
- Large habitat restoration. Create statewide permit.

Supply

- Water rights during drought. Undertake legal, administrative and technical improvements for water right management during "periods of shortage."
- Direct potable reuse. Charter outside expert panel for recommendations.
- Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA). Develop interagency data tool for groundwater extraction monitoring.

Other

California Water Commission (CWC)

The California Water Commission staff and stakeholders held a 3-hour presentation entitled: "Defining Resilience and Considering Conveyance in the Context of Climate Change." The Water Resilience Portfolio, Executive Orders, and associated policies are accelerating regulatory decisions reaching beyond the traditional programs and impacts. No longer simply infrastructure, the Commission may define conveyance as:

- Transformational, as a climate change management tool
- Multi-benefit, to "enhance and preserve ecosystem and human right to water"
- Beyond concrete and steel, to accommodate "functioning natural systems,"
- Funded and built if a project would "account for needs of environment, all humans"

Temperance Flat Reservoir Authority (TFRA)

Temperance Flat Reservoir Agency confirmed to the California Water Commission (CWC) it surrendered \$170 million in Prop 1 storage funding. The CWC then scheduled a decision on how to reallocate the funds for its December meeting, including taking new or expanding current applications. This will be highly competitive if the CWC opens the door; deadline for CWC approval would be Jan. 1, 2021.

Resource Conservation Districts (RCD)

David Fey of Fresno Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCo) has responded to KRCD's letter expressing concerns about the potential expansion of the Sphere of Influence (SOI) for both Tranquility RCD (TRCD) and Sierra (SRCD) RCD. He responded to KRCD, Consolidated Irrigation District (CID), Alta Irrigation District (AID), and Fresno Irrigation District (FID) in the same email. In summary, TRCD has amended their request to reduce the expansion to the boundary of McMullin Area Groundwater Sustainability Agency. This removes the proposed expansion from the areas

covered by FID and CID, and since KRCD had listed this result as the second-best acceptable outcome, it appears that Fresno LAFCo will recommend approval of the amended SOI expansion for TRCD. Follow-up will be made regarding the question of LAFCo requiring a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between TRCD and other entities with overlapping service areas (KRCD included).

As regards SRCD, Mr. Fey noted that all letters Fresno LAFCo received expressed similar concerns with expansion of the SOI, but also expressed a willingness to engage directly in dialogue with current SRCD Manager Steve Haze. Mr. Fey noted that he accepts this offer of engagement, and will rely on that dialogue resulting in a middle ground mutually acceptable to all involved.

World Aq Expo

For the first time in show history, the 2021 World Ag Expo will be online. The Expo will kick off February 9^{th} - 11^{th} , 2021 – the original show dates. Live events and seminars will be scheduled 9:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. each day, but content will be available on-demand, at no charge to attendees, around the clock.

Federal Affairs

President Trump has not conceded the election, but President-elect Joe Biden is forging ahead with his transition. Biden has tapped Ron Klain as his Chief of Staff. Klain served as Chief of Staff to Vice President Biden. Jen O'Malley Dillon, who served as Biden's campaign manager, will be his Deputy Chief of Staff. Louisiana Congressman Cedric Richmond, former chair of the Congressional Black Caucus, will lead the White House Office of Public Engagement, and Julie Rodriguez will lead the White House Office of Intergovernmental Relations. Rodriguez played a pivotal role in both Vice President-elect Harris' and President-elect Biden's campaigns.

While rumors continue regarding who President-elect Biden will select to serve in his Cabinet, only a few official nominations have occurred:

- Secretary of State Antony Blinken, who served as Deputy Secretary of State in the Obama Administration
- Treasury Secretary, Janet Yellen, former Chair of the Federal Reserve
- Secretary of Homeland Security Alejandro Mayorkas who served as Deputy Secretary of Homeland Security in the Obama Administration
- U.N. Ambassador Linda Thomas-Greenfield, who served as Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs in the Obama Administration

The Senate returned to Washington on November 9th, and the House of Representatives (House) returned on November 16th, to begin the final legislative days of the outgoing 116th Congress – also referred to as a "lame duck session" of Congress. Congress is expected to adjourn by December 18th, although this date may slip if extra time is needed to finalize legislative votes. With this schedule, the Senate will be in session for 24 legislative days, and the House for 13 legislative days. With limited workdays, there is a narrow timeframe for Congress to pass several important pieces of legislation, including final Fiscal Year 2021 appropriations bills, another COVID relief package, the Water Resources Development Act, the Fiscal Year 2021 National Defense Authorization Act, and more.

House Democrats nominated Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi to serve in the role again in the 117th Congress. Speaker Pelosi also seemed to suggest these would be her final two years in the leadership post. House Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy easily won reelection to lead Republicans in the House in the 117th Congress, a stunning turnaround as the entire GOP leadership team was rewarded by their colleagues for reducing the Democrats' House advantage in the November election.

Senator John Barrasso (R-WY) announced that he plans to become the top Republican on the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee (ENR Committee), a move that would vacate his leadership role on the Environment and Public Works Committee. Senator Barrasso would be filling the seat vacated by Senator Lisa Murkowski (R-AK), who is leaving under Republican conference rules that

limit the number of terms a senator can be the chair or ranking member of a committee. On the Senate ENR Committee, Senator Barrasso may take a more conservative approach than the relatively moderate Senator Murkowski, who often worked on bipartisan priorities with the Committee's top Democrat, Senator Joe Manchin (WV).

Leadership positions in the Senate for the 117th Congress are contingent on the outcome of the two Senate runoff races taking place in Georgia on January 5th. The outcome of those two races will determine which party will have control of the Senate in the new Congress. Currently, Republicans hold the majority at 50-48. If the incumbents, Republican Senators David Perdue and Kelly Loeffler, win reelection, the GOP will retain control of the Senate with a final split of 52-48. However, if Democrat challengers Jon Ossoff and Raphael Warnock win, the seats for each party will be tied at 50-50. With Vice President-elect Kamala Harris serving as the President of the Senate, Democrats will be granted control of the Senate. If this occurs, Democrats will control both chambers of Congress as well as the White House, providing President-elect Biden the opportunity to advance significant policy initiatives.

Legislative

Bills

Staff are monitoring several bills (see attachment). Below are updates on new bills or bills that have had activity during the month of November:

Corps Bills

Water Resources Development Act (WRDA)

House and Senate WRDA bills would authorize the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) to carry out a two-year roadmap of water infrastructure projects.

H.R. 7575: The "Water Resources Development Act" would make available \$10 billion from the Harbor Maintenance Trust Fund to address repair needs of the nation's largest ports and the Great Lakes harbors, as well as other ports. It would direct funds for 38 new projects and 35 studies that include repairing locks and dams on inland waterways to boosting coastal shorelines against flooding and protecting the nation's waters against invasive species. The measure passed the House on July 29th by voice vote.

S. 3591: "America's Water Infrastructure Act" would authorize \$17 billion for Corps water infrastructure projects.

S. 3590: The "Drinking Water Infrastructure Act" would authorize \$2.5 billion for programs to clean up manmade chemicals known as PFAS (Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances) and other contaminants, among other programs, and would reauthorize a safe drinking water emergency fund. Senators John Barrasso (R-WY), chairman of the Senate Environment and Public Works (EPW) Committee, and Senator Tom Carper (D-DE), the committee's ranking Democrat, introduced S. 3590 and S. 3591. The EPW Committee approved both bills on May 6th with no dissenting votes.

House and Senate staff have been informally negotiating and seeking to reconcile differences behind the scenes for many weeks. Leaders in both chambers remain optimistic that floor time can be found for a vote on agreed-upon legislation before the end of the calendar year.

Reclamation Bills

Aerial Snowpack Observatory (ASO)

Staff from the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee and the House Natural Resources Committee continue to work on legislative language for a "Reclamation title" to potentially include as

part of the WRDA reauthorization package. Legislation supported by Kings River to authorize a new program under Reclamation for continued ASO programs continues to be included in negotiations and has a strong chance of being included in the final package. However, at this time, it is still unclear if a Reclamation title will be approved for inclusion in WRDA.

In addition, the House Fiscal Year 2021 Energy and Water Development Appropriations bill urges Reclamation to continue to support the Airborne Snow Observatory Program, but does not provide specific funding direction. However, the report accompanying the Senate Fiscal Year 2021 Energy and Water Development Appropriations bill includes the following language and identifies \$3 million for snow modeling activities through Reclamation:

Snow Modeling Data Processing Better snow modeling and estimates of snow water equivalent may improve water resource decision-making, specifically for water allocations and flood control. Of the additional funding recommended in this account, \$3,000,000 shall be to support Reclamation's efforts to support the U. S. Department of Agriculture and NOAA efforts to improve real-time and derived snow water equivalent information such that it can be immediately used for water resources decision-making. The Committee directs Reclamation to continue and expand its partnerships with other Federal water management agencies, including the Corps, the Agricultural Research Service, and the Natural Resources Conservation Service on the use of new technologies related to improved direct measurements and derived projects that allow for better water resources management.

Budget

Fiscal Year 2021 Appropriations

Shortly after returning from the November election, Senate Republicans released draft Fiscal Year 2021 spending bills to set the stage for House and Senate negotiators to attempt to work out a compromise appropriations package over the next several weeks. Currently, a stopgap government funding bill is scheduled to expire on December 11th, so lawmakers are hoping to reach agreement on an omnibus Fiscal Year 2021 spending plan before that deadline. If such a deal cannot be reached, Congress would instead likely approve another continuing resolution to avoid a government shutdown and move the final Fiscal Year 2021 appropriations decisions into the New Year.

The House and the Senate are not far apart in terms of overall spending levels for each bill, which should make final negotiations somewhat smoother. Below is a chart comparing the Fiscal Year 2021 Appropriations bills passed by the House Appropriations Committee earlier in 2020; the Fiscal Year 2021 Appropriations bills released by Senate Republicans; and the enacted Fiscal Year 2020 funding levels for each bill. The Agriculture and Financial Services figures are adjusted to include the Commodity Futures Trading Commission, which is handled by different subcommittees in the House and Senate:

\$4.722 million in funding for Pine Flat is identified in the President's Budget Request and supported in both the House and Senate Fiscal Year 2021 Energy and Water Development Appropriations bills. This means that funding is almost certain to move forward at the level identified.

The Republicans released their Fiscal Year 2021 appropriations bill that would provide the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) with just under \$9.1 billion next year, roughly in line with the agency's Fiscal Year 2020 appropriation. Within that sum, \$1.126 billion would be set aside for the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (SRF) and \$1.639 billion would go to the Clean Water SRF – each equal to current funding. The Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) program would at \$60 million, while a program to reduce lead in drinking water would get a slight bump to \$21.5 million. The Drinking Water System Resilience and Sustainability Program would receive \$4 million, a \$1 million increase above current funding.

The Senate Republican spending proposal comes several months after House Democrats approved their own Fiscal year 2021 EPA appropriations. The Senate bill's allocations for water infrastructure programs are generally in line with the House's, with the exception of WIFIA. The House measure threatened to zero-out new WIFIA appropriations next year due to a dispute over EPA's implementation of scoring criteria that seek to prevent Federally owned projects from receiving program loans. Instead of providing new funds, the House plan would require EPA to fund new WIFIA projects by rescinding previously appropriated dollars that have not yet been spent. The Senate plan would avoid this scenario by providing \$60 million in new funding to the program.

Other

Chairmanship of the House Agriculture Committee

California Representative Jim Costa and Georgia Representative David Scott are vying for the chairmanship of the House Agriculture Committee. Congressman Costa so far has received backing from 70 California agriculture groups (see attached letter), including KRCD and KRWA. Congressman Scott is supported by committee colleagues. Representative Scott would become the first African American to lead the Committee if he wins. Representative Jim Costa would become the first chairman from California since Republican John Bidwell served from 1865 to 1867.

KRCD's Twitter gained 6 followers and saw a 68% increase in engagement, and went from 0 link clicks to 32. KRCD interacted positively with the office of Assemblymember Salas, the Tulare Basin Watershed Partnership, and the Department of Conservation on the Watershed Restoration Grant.

WATER QUALITY

Kings River Water Quality Coalition (KRWQC or Coalition)

KRWQC Board Meeting


The next KRWQC meeting is December 15th; no meeting was held in November.

Fill Station Development and Construction

In November, the Hanford fill station averaged 65 gallons of daily water usage. Weekly bacteria samples collected at the fill station in November resulted in absent results. Staff continue to implement solutions and modify maintenance schedules as necessary at the fill station.

In November, the Kerman Fill Station averaged 75 gallons daily water usage. Weekly bacteria samples collected at the fill station in October resulted in absent results. The City of Kerman approved usage of their logo in fill station outreach postcards in late November. Postcards will be mailed in early December to nitrate impacted areas with additional mailings and marketing occurring December through February.

The County of Tulare Board of Supervisors approved the License Agreement for Fill Station Installation, Operation, and Maintenance at the Tulare County Dinuba Branch Library (150 S. I St., Dinuba, CA) on November 17th. Consultants for the KRWQC are working with the City of Dinuba on the building permit, which is anticipated in December.



Nitrate Management Zones

Staff continue to work with legal counsel for the formation of a non-profit organization for the KRWQC Management Zone, now called the Kings Water Alliance (KWA). Articles of incorporation were filed in November with bylaws and the seating of the Board anticipated in December. The KWA hosted a community engagement webinar on the Nitrate Control Program and Early Action Plan on November 19th. Webinar sessions focused on providing an overview of the Nitrate Control Program, the local management zone, early action plan, temporary replacement water, and staying engaged in the process. The next community engagement webinar will be held January 28, 2021. A KWA interim technical committee meeting will be held on December 4th. The KWA Board and/or stakeholders meeting is anticipated in mid-December.

Isotope Study – Phase 2

As of November 2020, KRWQC staff are working with consultants to finalize the report with Dr. Brad Esser. Staff had a conference call with Dr. Esser and his staff in November to discuss the findings of the overall study and the finalization of report's conclusions.

KRWQC Membership Activities

The new KRWQC Member Portal was launched to members on November 2nd. Members have been using the portal to pay their bills and edit their field acreage to prepare for 2020's reporting deadline on March 1, 2021. The internal reporting/delegate system has been built for members to begin their 2020 Nitrogen Reporting.

So far, we have received a total of 93 online payments (\$20,028) & 139 Check Payments (\$85,760) for a total of \$105,788.

Web-Based Submittal Database

The member portal went live on November 2nd. Members can access their member contact information, reset their password, make changes to enrolled parcels, view invoice, request a revised invoice as needed, make payments, utilize mapping tools, approve delegate permissions, access additional resources, member history and submit a Farm Evaluation and Irrigation and Nitrogen Management Plan (INMP) Summary Report. Outreach content will be available in December and Groundwater Management Practices Implementation Report will be available later. Web developers have provided a test version of the delegate portal and have begun review. Delegate access is scheduled to be rolled out on of December 2nd. Michael L. Johnson, LLC. (MLJ) provided a finalized version of the database frontend along with updated instructional material.

KRWQC Outreach Activities

The Coalition sent out emails to all members with an email address on file providing them with a temporary password and access to the updated member portal. Members were also provided a verification code on their invoice that would allow access to the member portal for those without an email address.

Nitrogen Management Plan Evaluation Packets will be mailed to all members at the beginning of December providing members with a summary of their 2017, 2018, and 2019 NMP Summary Report data; 3-year Nitrogen use evaluation when available; and 2019 Nitrogen use evaluation. Members are also informed of required further actions for identified outlier parcels.

Surface Water Quality Monitoring Plan Revisions

No updates to the development of a revised Surface Water Monitoring Plan occurred in November.

Surface Water Quality Sampling Activities

Surface water samples were collected from two out of eight sites at Manning Ave and Jackson Avenue on Monday, November 16th. Field sheets and photo documentation were collected at all sites, this included the six dry sites of Gould Canal, Tivy Valley, Lemoore Weir, Empire 2 Weir, Crescent Weir, and Stinson Weir. Due to a delay in the availability of the Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR) data required for the completion of the Pesticide Evaluation Protocol (PEP), the Coalition requested and was granted an extension for the 2021 PEP submittal.

Drain Survey Activities

The November 2020 drain survey was conducted on the 16th and 24th of the month. The majority of the upper river from Army Corps Bridge to Hwy 41 was assessed on the 16th, along with a portion of the South Fork drains. The remainder of the drains were assessed on the 24th of November. In continuity with the sharp decrease in water deliveries, the river only flows past the city of Reedley and many drains were not discharging into the riverbed or isolated pools.

Groundwater Quality Trend Monitoring Plan

A meeting with the Regional Board to discuss the revised methodology for the Groundwater Quality Trend Monitoring Plan is anticipated in the next few months. Upon approval of the revised methodology, the Coalition anticipates further modifications to the well network and sampling procedures for 2021.

Groundwater Quality Trend Monitoring Activities

Groundwater data for 2020 has been processed and should be uploaded to GeoTracker by MIJ Environmental.

Comprehensive Groundwater Quality Management Plan

The Regional Water Quality Control Board is still reviewing the Groundwater Protection Targets submitted by the Coalitions, and once any issues are addressed, work on a revised Comprehensive Groundwater Management Plan that incorporates the Protection Targets and the Phase II MPIR will be drafted.

Southern San Joaquin Valley Management Practices Evaluation Program (MPEP) Committee

John Dickey reported that the Conservation Innovation Grant (CIG) application submitted by the MPEP group was not selected for funding. Consequently, technical work is being scaled back until the committee decides how to proceed. Fertilizer Research and Education Program (FREP) contract amendments are awaiting approval. Development of Nitrogen removed formulas are continuing. PlanTierra is working on the 2018 Nitrogen Summary Report data and incorporating it into the existing data set. Revisions to the ETa tool for the coalitions is awaiting data from DWR.

KRWQC/KRCD serves as the Fiscal Agent for this Committee. (Participants: Kings, Kaweah, Tule, Kern, Cawelo, Westside, Buena Vista Coalitions).

Central Valley Salinity Alternatives for Long-Term Sustainability (CV-SALTS)

The CV-SALTS Executive Committee met on November 19th. Management Zone governance structures are being formed and cooperative interactions between the Priority 1 subbasins developing Management Zones are underway. Four letters were received from the Environmental Justice Community regarding Basin Plan Amendment language that will be considered at the December Regional Water Quality Control Board meeting. Lastly, consultants discussed revisions to the Salinity Prioritization and Optimization Workplan including an agreement for permittees selecting to participate in the alternative salinity permitting approach.

KRWQC/KRCD is the fiscal agent for this group. (Participants: Kings, Kaweah, Tule, Kern)

Central Valley Groundwater Monitoring Collaborative (CVGMC)

The CVGMC has approved the workplan/budget proposed by Luhdorff & Scalmanini Consulting Engineers (LSCE) and is proceeding with the effort. Almost all the 2020 groundwater data has been reported by the CVGMC members and will be uploaded to GeoTracker. Kings data has been received, reviewed and uploaded.

KRWQC/KRCD is the fiscal agent for this group. (Participants: Cawelo, Buena Vista, East San Joaquin, Kern, Kings, Kaweah, Kern, Westside, Westlands)

Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB) Activities

Regional Board staff have not taken any enforcement actions during the month of November 2020.

State Water Board Petition of the East San Joaquin General Order

The Superior Court has ruled against the Plaintiffs regarding their challenge to the East San Joaquin Order revisions. It is unclear if they will appeal, which if lost, would not only affect the Region 5 orders, but the legal challenges to the Region 3 (Central Coast) orders as well.

The Surface Water Expert Panel found that the East San Joaquin approach to Surface Water Monitoring was adequate and addressed the requirements of the Order. Some recommendations were made in the final report, which the Regional Board may or may not incorporate into other Surface Water Monitoring plans.

WATER RESOURCES

Sustainable Groundwater Management Act of 2014 (SGMA)

Groundwater Sustainability Planning (GSP) Related Activities

North Fork Kings Groundwater Sustainability Agency (GSA) Implementation

The North Fork Kings GSA has two policies including the GSA's Rules and Regulations and Groundwater Banking Policy available for review and comment. The Rules and Regulations will lay the foundation for monitoring, well registration, measurement, and data management. The Banking Policy discusses the GSA's role in new project development. Comments will be accepted until December 2nd, and it is anticipated that the NFK Board will consider approval in mid-December.

North Fork Kings GSA Grant Activities

Round 3, Invoice 8 was submitted to DWR for review on November 25, 2020.

South Fork Kings GSA Implementation

The comment period for the South Fork Kings GSA's Groundwater Data Protection policy concluded on November 18th; no comments were received, the policy is intended to ensure data confidentiality as the GSA collects needed information from groundwater extractors. The SFK GSA Board will consider adoption of the policy at the December meeting.

South Fork Kings GSA Grant Activities

In November, the Regional Board contacted staff regarding the Aquifer Storage and Recovery pilot project and concluded that a waste discharge permit is not necessary for the pilot project. As such, the consultant will proceed with the next phase of the project.

California Statewide Groundwater Elevation Monitoring Program (CASGEM)

Data has been collected by KRCD staff on our monitoring well network, and data is being reported slowly from the other cooperating agencies. Follow up with those who have not reported data took take place mid-November. Some of the missing data was received, data sharing discussions are occurring to determine the level of participation in regions where data was not received.

KRCD Subsidence Monitoring

KRCD has received executed subsidence cost-sharing agreements or promises of signed agreements based on completed board approvals. Two GSA's, James and McMullin Area,

opted not to approve the agreement. Kings River East and Central Kings recently approved the agreement; the survey of their areas is scheduled for early December.

The rest of the 2020 subsidence survey, including SGMA network points and KRCD levee monitoring points, was completed in October. Staff are compiling notes, pictures, and data but is waiting until the whole survey is complete to avoid unnecessary additional processing time for the surveys that were recently approved.

Kings Basin Water Authority (KBWA)

Board of Directors

The next regular meeting of the KBWA Board of Directors is scheduled for April 21, 2021.

Advisory Committee

The next regular meeting of the KBWA Advisory Committee is scheduled for March 17, 2021.

Prop 1 Disadvantaged Communities (DACs) Involvement Grant

The next meeting of the Project Advisory Committee is scheduled for January 21, 2021.

Prop 1, Round 1 IRWM Implementation Grant

Fresno Metropolitan Flood Control District (FMFCD) and KRCD staff continue to work with DWR on finalizing the grant agreement.

Inter-regional and Statewide Coordination

A Roundtable of Regions meeting was held on November 18th via Zoom. The Roundtable received updates from DWR on IRWM related programs including the status of the Prop 1 DAC Involvement Program and Prop 1 Round 1 Implementation grant awards. The Roundtable also received reports from Steering Committee members regarding the IRWM Pre-Summit Orientation held on September 10th; Maven's Notebook blog post activities; the IRWM-SGMA Webinar held on September 23rd; and the DAC Virtual Summit held on October 8th, 13th, and 14th. Lastly, the Roundtable was informed of a letter from the San Francisco IRWM group requesting the Roundtable's assistance in developing guidance on how to ensure racial equity in IRWM. The Roundtable intends to form a workgroup to further explore this topic.

Kings River Conservation District Grants

McMullin On-Farm Flood Water Capture and Recharge Project

Staff continue to work with DWR on requesting release of retention for several project tasks that have been completed.

Prop 84 Statewide Flood Emergency Response Grant Program

No activities to report.

WATER RESOURCES DIVISION ACTIVITIES

Geographic Information System (GIS) Projects

<u>SGMA</u>

Work has begun on a set of school district maps for External Affairs to use in outreach for the Kings Subbasin GSAs. Staff will review, compile, and share the fall groundwater

measurements with the subbasin consultants once the field crew has finished inputting the data.

KRWQC

Staff wrote an explanation of the GPS survey process used for the trend monitoring wells and is verifying the data included in the revised plan.

Flood Maintenance

Staff created a map of parcels and owners near the eastern Excelsior Bridge (near Lemoore Weir) for law enforcement use. Staff are researching as-built drawing and historical aerial photographs to help determine the status of a canal adjacent to the levee system. Work continues to digitize the Right-of-Way and easement paper files.

ENVIRONMENTAL DIVISION

Flood Maintenance Support Activities

On November 6th, staff completed post-project biological surveys for a Flood Maintenance repair to the land-side slope of the levee near the Lemoore Well Field. On November 13th, post-project biological surveys were conducted for erosion repair to the levee in three sites between Lacey Avenue and Fremont Avenue.

Fisheries Management Program (FMP)

Incubator Building

There has been limited response from volunteers to the trout incubator program for the upcoming rearing period. Four waivers have been returned by volunteers, and a handful of additional volunteers have indicated interest but have yet to return waivers. The incubator is currently offline until December 2020; operations will resume at the end of the month.

HOBO Temperature Loggers

HOBO temperature loggers were downloaded by staff on November 17th and 20th. Of the nine loggers located between the Army Corps of Engineer bridge and Highway 180, five were repositioned to spots which should contain the loggers within the wetted channel year-round. This should provide a greater understanding of temperature within the river and may provide insight into locations trout may be able to hold in during periods of thermal stress elsewhere in the river.

<u>Electrofishing</u>

Staff continue to work on generating a comprehensive electrofishing report for the years 2007-2019. Data from past years has completed the verification process and is now being organized into annual tables for inclusion in the report and being prepared for analysis.

Executive Committee Meeting (ExCom)

ExCom met on October 5th; topics discussed included reservoir and water conditions, planned trout incubator operations, a report on planned and completed fish stocking in the lower Kings River, and a report on the status of the projects selected for habitat enhancement of the lower river. California Dept. of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) provided the ExCom with a presentation of their findings of the creel survey conducted this past winter on the lower Kings River. The next meeting is scheduled for April 1, 2021.

Technical Steering Committee (TSC)

The TSC met on November 24th. Topics discussed included reservoir and water conditions, including projections of the upcoming water year, the status of stocking on the lower river, and a discussion of the budget and task proposal developed by Cramer Fish Sciences of the three habitat enhancement projects the TSC is considering. The next regular meeting is scheduled for January 26, 2021.

Public Advisory Group (PAG)

The PAG meeting was conducted via Zoom on November 17th, KRWA staff provided updates to the public on reservoir and water conditions, KRCD staff provided updates on the incubator activities and the status of supplemental stocking, and CDFW provided a stocking report for the annual allocation. For December, the PAG will receive an update via e-mail of reservoir and river conditions, as well as stocking information. The next live PAG meeting is scheduled to occur via Zoom on January 19, 2021.

Stocking

Supplemental Stocking Plan

Supplemental stocking of rainbow trout by Calaveras Trout Farm (CTF) began the week of November 1^{st} . Stocking of catchable sized trout occurred weekly, except for the week of November 8^{th} as there were concerns water temperature was still too high to safely stock trout. Weekly stocking resumed the week of November 15^{th} . For November, 3,500 lbs. (~10,500 trout), were released into the Kings River, with ~80% into the Put & Take Zone (Reach 1) and ~20% into the Catch & Release Zone (Reach 2).

CDFW Annual Budgeted Stocking

Stocking by CDFW in the lower Kings River occurred bi-weekly in November. Since July, 10,360 brook trout (5,200 lbs.), and 26,885 rainbow trout (3,275 lbs.) have been stocked in the river. Of those fish, 25,025 trout were sub-catchable size while the remainder were catchable sized. Stocking of 400 lbs. of catchable trout is expected to occur bi-weekly for the near term. Eighteen thousand pounds of trout are expected to be delivered to the lower Kings River in the current fiscal year. The annual allotment will include sub-catchable, catchable, and super-catchable or trophy sized trout and will consist of both rainbow trout and brook trout.

This report covers the activities of the Jeff L. Taylor Pine Flat Power Plant, Kings River Flood Operations & Maintenance, Environmental / Fisheries, Capital and Grant Projects. Accounting / Business Operations and Water Resources are provided separately from the CFO and Director of Water Resources, respectively.

This is the monthly status report for the CFO for the month of November 2020, and includes input from the Finance, Human Resources and Admin Departments.

I presented financial reports at the meeting of the McMullin Area Groundwater Sustainability Agency (MAGSA) and attended a South Fork Kings Groundwater Sustainability Agency (SFKGSA) finance committee.

The Other Post-Employment Benefit (OPEB) actuarial evaluation was completed in November. The District's calculated total OPEB liability decreased from \$8.6 million to \$7.9 million. Factors that influenced the decrease include the participant census at the measurement date, updated mortality and demographic tables and an updated medical inflation trend rate.


The KRCD audit was completed in December and will be presented at the December board meeting. The audits of the Kings River Water Quality Coalition and the Groundwater Sustainability Agencies are in process. Auditors have been performing the audits remotely, examining the books and records and working with staff to answer questions and perform testing of the financial statements.

Stacy Wright, Manager of Human Resources, attended various on-line webinars and training sessions to keep her understanding of ever-changing HR issues and laws up to date. In November, Stacy notified the employees and directors of the open enrollment opportunities for the District's health insurance and Section 125 Cafeteria plans for the year. Throughout the month, Stacy continued to coordinate and manage recruitments for the Hydroelectric Power Plant Manager and Program and Regulatory Analyst for the environmental program. The vacancies are open until filled and are expected to be filled by the first of the year.




KINGS RIVER CONSERVATION DISTRICT BUDGET TO ACTUAL COMPARISON


KINGS RIVER CONSERVATION DISTRICT BUDGET TO ACTUAL COMPARISON

CONSULTANT AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made this ____ day of December, 2020, by and between KINGS RIVER EAST GROUNDWATER SUSTAINABILITY AGENCY (hereinafter "KREGSA") and KINGS RIVER WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT (hereinafter "Consultant").

Article I Term of Contract

This Agreement will become effective upon its execution by the parties. Consultant will commence work under this Agreement upon the parties' execution of a Scope of Services. This Agreement will remain in effect until terminated by written notice from one of the parties as hereinafter provided in Articles VII or VIII.

Article II Independent Contractor

Consultant enters into this agreement, and will remain throughout the term of the agreement, an independent contractor. Consultant agrees that neither it nor any of its employees will become an employee of KREGSA while this agreement is in effect. Consultant agrees that while this agreement is in effect that neither it nor any of its employees is or shall become entitled to the rights or benefits afforded to KREGSA'S employees, if any, including disability or unemployment insurance, workers' compensation, medical insurance, sick leave, or any other employment benefit. Consultant is responsible for providing, at Consultant's own expense, disability, unemployment, any other insurance, workers' compensation, training, permits, and licenses for Consultant and for its employees and subcontractors, if any.

Article III Authorized Representatives

The Executive Officer of KREGSA, or her designated representative, shall be the authorized representative of KREGSA with respect to all of Consultant's dealings with KREGSA in connection with Consultant's work pursuant to this agreement. Consultant shall designate an authorized employee or representative to represent it with respect to its dealings with KREGSA in connection with Consultant's work pursuant to this agreement.

Article IV Scope of Services

Any services to be provided by Consultant to KREGSA under this Agreement must be set forth in a writing signed by the parties hereto (a "Scope of Services" agreement). Consultant will have no obligation to perform any services under a Scope of Services unless it is fully executed by both parties. Each Scope of Services shall be subject to and incorporate by reference all of the provisions of this Agreement. If there is a discrepancy between the terms of this Agreement and a Scope of Services, the provisions of this agreement will control.

Article V Indemnification

5.1 Consultant and KREGSA will defend, indemnify and hold harmless each other, and their respective directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers, from all claims and demands of all persons or entities that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to their respective negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct in the performance (or actual or alleged non-performance) under the Scope of Services.

Article VI Compensation
 6.1 Consultant shall be compensated by KREGSA as set forth in a Scope of Services.
 6.2 Payment for those portions of the Scope of Services completed and related costs advanced by Consultant shall be made by KREGSA within thirty (30) days after receiving an invoice from Consultant for such items.

Article VII Termination By Either Party Without Cause

Either party may terminate this agreement, without cause, by giving the other party sixty (60) days written notice of such termination as provided in paragraph 13.2 of this agreement. In the event of termination, KREGSA agrees to pay for the value of work performed as of the date of termination as well as the cost of materials and equipment on hand, in transit, or on definite commitment, as of the date of termination, if such materials and equipment would be needed to complete a Scope of Services.

Article VIII Termination of Agreement for Cause

- 8.1 KREGSA may terminate the whole or any part of this agreement, including performance under a Scope of Services, if Consultant fails to timely complete any Scope of Services or if Consultant commits a material breach of this Agreement. Prior to terminating this agreement pursuant to this Paragraph 8.1, KREGSA must give the Consultant five (5) days written notice of its intent to terminate and an opportunity to cure the breach prompting such notice. Consultant may terminate the whole or any part of this agreement, including performance under a Scope of Services, if KREGSA fails to timely pay any invoice issued by Consultant or if KREGSA commits any other material breach of this Agreement. Prior to terminating this Agreement pursuant to this Paragraph 8.1, Consultant must give the KREGSA five (5) days written notice of its intent to terminate and an opportunity to cure the failure to pay or other breach prompting such notice.
- 8.2 In the event KREGSA terminates this agreement, as provided above in Article VII or paragraph 8.1 of this agreement, KREGSA may procure, upon such terms and such manner as it may determine, appropriate services similar to those terminated.
- 8.3 Should this agreement be terminated, as provided above in Article VII or paragraph 8.1 of this agreement, Consultant shall provide KREGSA with all finished and unfinished documents, data, studies, services, drawings, maps, models, photographs, reports, etc., prepared by Consultant pursuant to this agreement. Upon termination as provided above in Article VII or paragraph 8.1 of this agreement, Consultant shall be paid the value of the work performed, less payments of compensation previously made.

Article IX Ownership of Consultant's Work Product

Upon termination of this agreement, ownership and title to all reports and documents produced pursuant to this agreement will automatically be vested in KREGSA and no further contract or agreement will be necessary to transfer ownership to KREGSA.

Article X Assignment

Neither this agreement nor any duties or obligation under this agreement may be assigned by a party hereto without the prior written consent of the other party.

Article XI Attorney Fees

If any legal action, including an action for declaratory relief, is brought to enforce or interpret the provisions of this agreement, the prevailing party will be entitled to reasonable attorneys' fees, costs of suit and expert witness fees, which may be set by the court in the same action or in a separate action brought for that purpose, in addition to any other relief to which that party may be entitled.

Article XII Miscellaneous Provisions

- 13.1 Consultant covenants that Consultant presently has no interest, and shall not have any interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner with its performance of this agreement.
- 13.2 Any notices required to be given under this agreement by either party to the other may be effected in writing by personal delivery or by mail (registered or certified), postage prepaid with return receipt requested. Mailed notices must be addressed to the parties at their addresses as follows:

Each party may change its foregoing address by giving written notice in accordance with this paragraph. Notices delivered personally will be deemed communicated as of actual receipt. Mailed notices will be deemed communicated as of the fifth day after mailing.

- 13.3 Any modification of this agreement will be effective only if it is in writing and signed by the party to be charged.
- 13.4 If any provision of this agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this agreement will continue in full force and effect without being impaired or invalidated in any way.
- 13.5 This agreement will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the

- State of California. The venue for any legal proceeding between KREGSA and Consultant regarding this agreement shall be in Fresno County.
- 13.6 KREGSA is subject to laws relating to public agencies which are part of this agreement as though fully set forth herein. Consultant shall comply with such federal and state laws as relate to the work provided for in this agreement or the overall project.
- 13.7 Time is of the essence as to the performance of each and every action required of one or more of the parties pursuant to this agreement
